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Keynote Speaker

Patrick J. Stefano

Pennsylvania State Senator, Senate District 32

Senator Pat Stefano was elected to represent the 32nd Senatorial District beginning in November of 2014.

A lifelong resident of Fayette County, Stefano graduated from Penn State Fayette with a degree in Business Administration. He was a third-generation business owner of his family's company, Stefano's Printing, and was a part of the family business since the early '80s.



Growing up as the son of two teachers, he has pledged to focus on students and will continue to work to ensure teachers have the tools they need to succeed.

Stefano has been involved with many local chambers and is a past president of the Fayette County Chamber of Commerce. He has worked county-wide, serving as a board member of the Fay-Penn Economic Development Council.

He is a lifetime member and former Board President of the American Heart Association, where he has volunteered for over 30 years. He has also dedicated his time to Junior Achievement, Rotary Club of Connellsville, YMCA of Laurel Highlands, Downtown Connellsville, and Boy Scouts Troop 180.

Pat and his family reside in Bullskin Township, Fayette County, and worship at St. Rita Parish in Connellsville and St. John in Scottdale.

Prior to serving as Chairman of the Veterans Affairs & Emergency Preparedness Committee, he served as Chairman of the Game and Fisheries and Law and Justice Committees.

Senator Stefano was named Chairman of the Senate Veterans Affairs & Emergency Preparedness Committee in January 2021. In his current chairmanship, he focuses on addressing the issues faced by the Commonwealth's veterans and emergency responders.

During this legislative session, he has championed several crucial legislative initiatives.

FIRE

SB ####, when introduced, would help shore up the funding that goes into the Fire Relief program. Fire Relief is funded through the 2% tax on Foreign Fire Insurance Companies. Over the past decade, revenues from this tax have

fluctuated. This measure would combine all of the funds received from the 2% tax on foreign fire insurance companies and foreign casualty insurance companies. A base amount would go to the Fire Relief Fund, and another base amount would go to the Municipal Pension Aid Fund.

SB 739 – now Act 10 of 2022 – codified the 2021 Ballot Question that was passed by the voters – permitting career and combination fire companies to apply for loans through the State Fire & EMS Loan program.

SB 1265 – would establish a Fire Course Registry within the Office of State Fire Commissioner so that all courses a firefighter takes will be accessible online to them and their fire company.

SB 1027 would permit Junior Firefighters to receive training on live burns at the age of 17 with the permission of their parent/guardian and fire chief.

SB 279 would exempt Firefighters and Fire Police from paying the Sales Tax when purchasing protective, communications, or accessory equipment with their own funds.

EMS

SB 739 – now Act 10 of 2022 – provided \$25 Million in Grants to EMS Providers – averaging \$37,000 each.

SB 861 would have Pennsylvania become the 22nd state to enter the EMS Compact. The Compact will help Pennsylvania bring in out-of-state EMS personnel in times of crisis (and vice versa). It would also help expedite the conversion of an individual's military credentials into EMS licensure.

SB 740 would help stabilize the Emergency Services Operating Fund (EMSOF) in 2021. Instead of passing SB 740, the General Assembly allocated an additional \$5 million in funding to help stabilize the Fund until revenues generated from traffic fines increased.

The Committee also advanced the following measures:

SB 158 would establish a medal of commendation for firefighters – a Red Star of Valor for exceptional heroism; a Red Heart for those injured in the line of duty; and a Medal of Ultimate Sacrifice.

SB 248 – now Act 87 of 2021 – designated September 27 of each year as First Responder Recognition Day.

HB 397 would permit counties, municipalities, and school districts to adopt resolutions or ordinances to establish earned income of property tax credits for first responders.

HB 2097 would extend the EMS Staffing Waiver until 2027.

Furthermore, the Committee held hearings on:

April 2021 regarding the implementation of Fire & EMS legislation, including Act 69 of 2019, Act 91 of 2020, and Act 93 of 2020.

September 2021 regarding the Next Generation of Firefighters.

October 2021 regarding the concept of county-wide public safety authorities (SB 698).

Stefano also recently reformed the Senate Fire & EMS (Emergency Medical Services) Caucus to address issues and initiatives that support first responders across the Commonwealth.



PA VOAD Dinner



Randy Padfield has more than 30 years of experience in emergency services delivery and training, including fire/rescue, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and emergency management/incident management disciplines.

Prior to his tenure at PEMA as Deputy Director for Response, he was the Director of the Public Safety Training Center at Harrisburg Area Community College. Padfield is also a member



of Pennsylvania Task Force 1 Urban Search and Rescue (US&R) Team where he serves as a Task Force Leader and member of the National US&R Incident Support Team, qualified as both a Division/Group Supervisor and Air Operations Branch Director.

He has been involved in numerous local, regional, state and federal responses throughout his career including the World Trade Center attack on September 11, 2001, Hurricane Katrina, and Hurricane Sandy.

Padfield is a certified fire service instructor through the Office of the State Fire Commissioner as well as a contract instructor for the National Fire Academy and Emergency Management Institute, where he specializes in NIMS All-Hazards Incident Command System (ICS) position-specific training programs. He is a Certified Flight Paramedic (FP-C) through the Board for Critical Care Transport Paramedic Certification (BCCTPC) and has previously worked as a per diem Flight Paramedic for 23 years.

He is a native of St. Clair, Schuylkill County and currently lives in Cumberland County with his wife and their two children.

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MaryAnn E. Tierney

Region 3 Administrator, Federal Emergency Management Agency

MaryAnn E. Tierney is currently serving in the role of Region 3 Administrator.

Mrs. Tierney was appointed Regional Administrator for FEMA Region 3 in August 2010 and also served concurrently as Acting Regional Administrator in FEMA Region 2 for ten months following the devastating effects of Hurricane Sandy on New York and New



Jersey. From April to June 2017 she served as the Acting Associate Administrator for Mission Support at FEMA Headquarters. From January to June 2021 she served as Acting FEMA Deputy Administrator at FEMA Headquarters.

As Regional Administrator, Mrs. Tierney is responsible for leading FEMA's efforts in the mid-Atlantic to help people before, during and after disasters.

From November 2006 to August 2010, Mrs. Tierney served as Director of Emergency Management in Philadelphia where she oversaw a transformation of the emergency management program by developing operational emergency plans, conducting multiagency training and exercises, building partnerships with the private sector and community organizations, and providing the public many avenues to stay informed during emergencies.

Mrs. Tierney also spent over seven years with the New York City Office of Emergency Management, ending her tenure as Assistant Commissioner for Planning and Preparedness. While working for the City of New York, Mrs. Tierney was responsible for developing and revising emergency plans as well as overseeing the City's recovery and mitigation activities. During the City's response to the attacks of September 11th, she held a key position coordinating debris management activities at the World Trade Center site and the Fresh Kills Landfill as well as the City's application for Federal funding to reimburse costs associated with response and recovery operations, which totaled over \$4.75 billion.

Mrs. Tierney has extensive experience coordinating large complex emergency response operations. She has managed over 60 EOC activations in New York City and Philadelphia and regularly deployed to large

emergencies to coordinate on-scene response activities. At FEMA, Mrs. Tierney is responsible for leading the Federal government's response to all presidentially declared emergencies and disasters in the mid-Atlantic. In October and November 2012, she served as a Deputy Federal Coordinating Officer for FEMA in New York City in response to Hurricane Sandy. In November 2017 she deployed to Puerto Rico and served as the Individual Assistance Branch Director. She is a qualified Federal Coordinating Officer and leads one of FEMA's four National Incident Management Assistance Teams focusing on crisis and complex incident operations.

Mrs. Tierney previously served on the Department of Defense Reserve Forces Policy Board as well as a principal member of the NFPA Technical Committee on Disaster/Emergency Management and Business Continuity Programs (NFPA 1600) and has taught graduate-level courses on emergency management.

Mrs. Tierney holds a Bachelor of Arts in political science from American University and a Master's in Public Administration with a concentration in public and nonprofit management from New York University. She has also completed the Executive Leadership Program at the Naval Postgraduate School's Center for Homeland Defense and Security, the Capstone Course for one star General and Flag Officers, the Joint Flag Officer Warfighting Course, and the Pinnacle Course for two and three star General and Flag Officers.

MaryAnn, her husband Ed, son Aiden, and dog Molly reside in South Philadelphia. She is an avid runner and home chef.

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
